Introduction

This Progress Report has been prepared in response to Special Condition No. 25 of the California Coastal Commission (CCC), Amendment to Coastal Development Permit, dated October 25, 2022, Coastal Development Permit Amendment No. 5-91-286-A13. The following provides the special condition followed by the requested information.

CCC Condition – "Progress Report. [Imposed under AB, amended by A11 and A13] Change Special Condition 25. Progress Report: The applicant shall agree in writing, prior to issuance of Amendment No. 11, for the review and approval by the Executive Director, to submit a biannual report detailing the progress of the Potrero Canyon Restoration Project and (1) an accounting of the expenditures to date, (2) projected expenditures of funds from the Potrero Canyon Trust Fund during the next six month period, (3) the remaining balance of the account, and (4) tasks yet to be undertaken and the projected costs of those tasks. The report shall analyze the feasibility of a project alternative that includes construction of a public access path vertically across Pacific Coast Highway, and a parking lot and restroom facility at the south (PCH) end of the canyon pursuant to Special Condition 8. The applicant shall submit the first report no later than November 22, 2022."

Current Balance

Response to No. (2) – Projected expenditures of funds from the Potrero Canyon Trust Fund during for the next six month period.

The work to be completed in the next 6 months includes finalizing construction for the landscaping phase of the project and continuing work with the landscape maintenance contractor for the first year of the five year maintenance period mandated by the project Habitat Mitigation and Maintenance Plan (HMMP). Projected costs associated with these activities are as shown below.

Response to No. (4) - Tasks yet to be undertaken and the projected costs of those tasks. The report shall analyze the feasibility of a project alternative that includes construction of a public access path vertically across Pacific Coast Highway, and a parking lot and restroom facility at the south (PCH) end of the canyon pursuant to Special Condition 8.

Upcoming tasks for the project include Years 2-5 of the 5-year maintenance phase and a lateral pedestrian trail.

Construction of a public access path vertically across Pacific Coast Highway, linking the Potrero Canyon Park and Will Rogers State Beach will be addressed as a part of the Potrero Canyon Pedestrian Bridge Project. The project is currently in Pre-Design. The Funds Transfer Agreement between the California Department of Transportation and City of Los Angeles was executed June 2022 for the state funding in the amount of \$11 million dollars. Related studies of a parking lot and restroom facility will be incorporated as part of the lateral trail to temescal phase of the project.

CCC Condition – "Consistent with the conditions of the permit, as amended, the report shall include separate line items for each of the following components of the riparian habit and park, including but not limited to: establishment of riparian habitat area, establishment of park open space, landscaping materials, trails materials, benches, signs, the fire/maintenance road, Friends Street Trail, and the lateral access trail to Pacific Coast Highway."

Response – The costs for the specific line items listed above, with the exception of the lateral access trail to Temescal Canyon (Item 9 below), have been included in the Grading and/or Landscaping phase of the project. A breakdown by specific line items follows;

CCC Condition – "Funding for the Friends Street Trail and lateral access trail between the mouth of Potrero Canyon and the intersection of Pacific Coast Highway and Temescal Canyon Road shall not be diverted from funds currently allocated to the riparian habitat and the park within Potrero Canyon. The lateral access trail shall be funded using the surplus funds currently detailed in the project budget, and may also receive funds currently budgeted for unanticipated conditions, contingency funds, and other funds which are unspent upon completion of sale of the seven residential lots, final grading of Potrero Canyon, and completion of the riparian habitat and park."

Response – Currently funding has only been allocated for Potrero Canyon Park. The funding for access to the beach will be from remaining funds after the work in the canyon is completed and/or other sources.

Federal earmark funding in the amount of \$1.15 million is currently in the process of being transferred to the City for use for the lateral access trail. The City is preparing to begin Pre-Design on the project once funds are available.

CCC Condition - If, upon review of any biannual progress report, the Executive Director determines that the remaining balance of the fund is insufficient as to complete the development consistent with the conditions of the permit, as amended, the applicant shall apply for an amendment to the permit within 60 days of Executive Director's notification unless the Executive Director determines that no amendment is legally necessary.

Response – Acknowledged.

CCC Condition - Additionally, the applicant shall immediately report any change to the project schedule to the Executive Director and the applicant shall apply for an amendment to the permit within 60 days of Executive Director's notification unless the Executive Director determines that no amendment is legally necessary.

Response – The City will report changes in schedule.
