Proposed Motion:

PPCC urges the Director of City Planning and the Department of City Planning (DCP), to consider rescinding the initiation of a General Plan Amendment (GPA) for the Retreat at Benedict Canyon Project, Case No. CPC-2018-1506-GPA-VZC-SP- SPP-SPR, located at 9704 - 9712 West Oak Pass Road; 9800, 9801 - 9815 West Wanda Park Drive; and 2534 North Hutton Drive, in the Bel Air-Beverly Crest Community Plan Area, in order to halt the development of this project in the Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone within the Benedict Canyon, where the impact on local wildlife and community fire safety are likely to be irreversible.

<u>Item 11.1: Temescal Canyon Road Motion:</u>

Whereas, Temescal Canyon Road (TCR) is a major artery for Pacific Palisades,

Whereas, it serves not only as a major roadway for daily commutes, including to and from Palisades High School which is located on TCR, but also as a major evacuation route.

Whereas, we have profound concerns with the way TCR has been re-striped, under the direction of LADOT, eliminating a lane of traffic travelling westbound.

Whereas, in light of recent natural disasters (storms close to home and fires in Hawaii) as well as the start of school (which results in even greater traffic backlog throughout the course of the day), we believe the current stripping of TCR compromises public safety – with drivers now attempting to skip lanes and drive along the yellow median or make unsafe U-Turns in the middle of this fast-paced road, creating perilous traffic conditions for all,

Whereas, CD11 informs us that there is enough space along the road to create interim lanes that would provide for two lanes of traffic in both directions,

Therefore, be it resolved that we support this alternative rather than the arrangement of lanes DOT has currently implemented, and believe it would be a vast roadway safety improvement.

Be it further resolved that; we urge LADOT to work closely with CD11 to immediately implement this alternative interim lane configuration providing for two continuous lanes in both directions on Temescal Canyon Road.
